1. INTRODUCTION

National Transmission Company South Africa (NTCSA) is in the process of applying for Environmental Authorisation from DFFE. National Transmission Company South Africa (NTCSA) is being guided by the NEMA Regulations of 2014 as amended to prepare EIA, Environmental Management Programme report (EMPr) and undertake a Public Participation Process (PPP).

Quality Environmental Management and Business Solutions cc (QEMS) has been appointed as the independent Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) to compile and submit the BAR, EMPr and undertake the PPP. Environmental Authorisation (EA) will be applied in line with the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Regulations published in Government Notice R324 and R327 of 2017. The following reports will be submitted to the relevant competent authorities: BAR will be submitted to DFFE, as required. Issues raised by Interested and Affected Parties (I&APs) will be incorporated in the Issues and Response report and submitted to DFFE for decision making. This document provides interested and/or affected parties (I&APs) with background information on the proposed project, its potential impacts, and the application and EIA/public participation process. It also outlines the manner in which I&APs can become involved in the project, receive information and raise issues that may be of interest and/or concern to them.

The impact assessment process involves technical and scientific investigations related to the potential impacts of the proposed Mutaliyo Investment Lodge on the environment. It is therefore essential that I&APs, through the public participation process, become actively involved in the project's environmental assessment process project in order to share information and give input that will be useful in assisting the relevant authorities in decision-making as far as this project is concerned. The response sheet attached to this document allows I&APs to comment and provide their inputs on the proposed project. The PPP is being conducted in accordance with Chapter 6 of NEMA as amended and EIA Regulations of 2014 in support of the EIA.

3. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

National Transmission Company South Africa (NTCSA) intends to expand the existing Gromis Substation by an additional 7 hectares, increasing the total substation footprint from 12 hectares to 19 hectares. The proposed expansion is intended to accommodate the installation of two Synchronous Condensers (SynCons) at the existing Gromis Substation, located within the jurisdiction of the Nama Khoi Local Municipality in the Namakwa District Municipality, Northern Cape Province. NTCSA plans to implement SynCons to enhance grid reliability and grow renewable energy adoption. SynCons will provide several ancillary energy services, increasing rotating inertia in order to improve grid stability. The SynCons do not generate power; however, through their inertial, rotating mass provide grid stability to the local area of the national transmission grid where they are located. Currently, the only inertial, rotating mass is provided largely by the coal-fired power stations, which are stationed in the north-eastern part of the country.

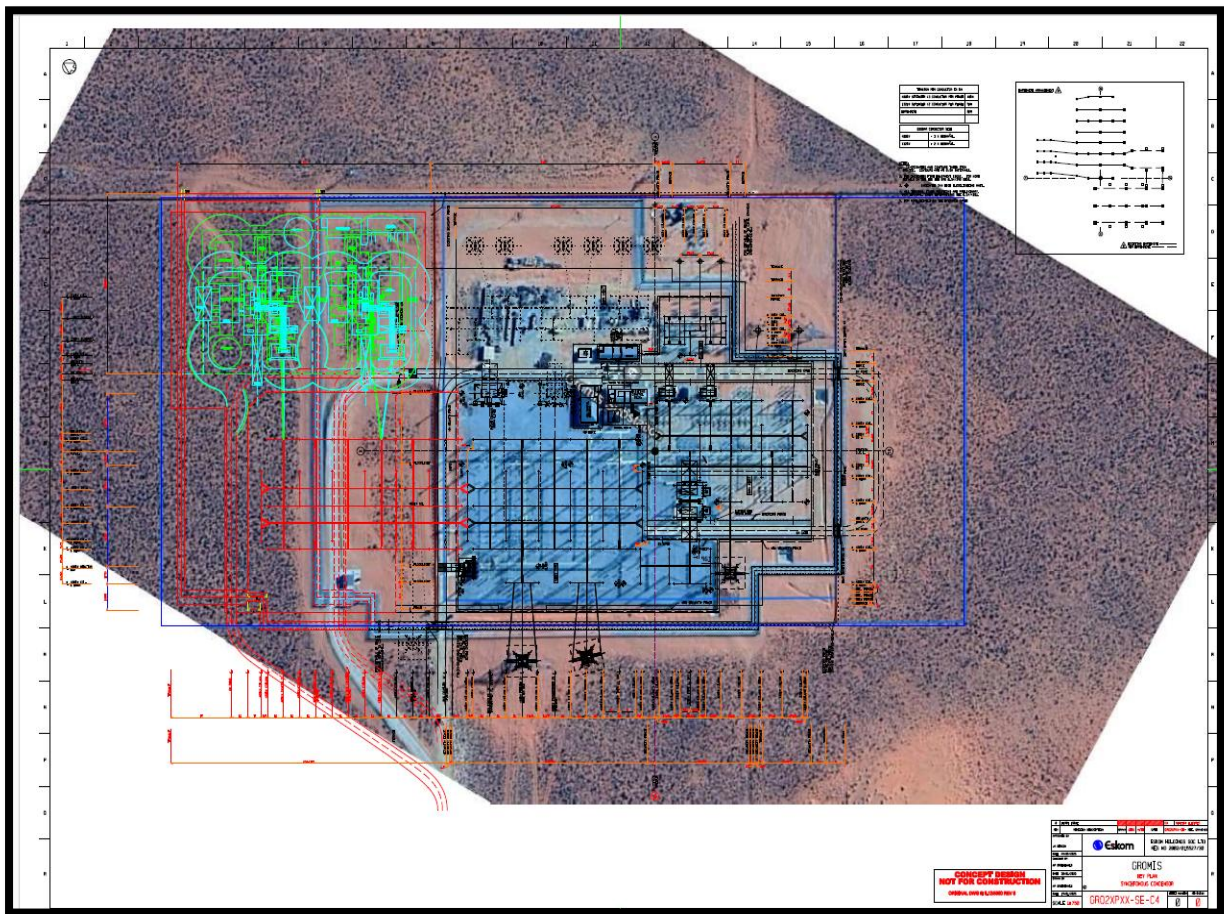


Figure 1: Layout

4. PROJECT LOCATION

The proposed expansion site is located on Farm Dikgat No. 195, covering approximately 7 hectares of land near the mine along the R355 Road, about 0.95 km to the north and approximately 68.30 km southwest of Springbok town. The proposed development falls within the Strategic Transmission Corridor (Figure 3). The central coordinates of the site are 29°36'4.71"S and 17°10'34.48"E. The site falls within the jurisdiction of the Nama Khoi Local Municipality of Namakwa District Municipality in Northern Cape Province. The table below depicts the Surveyor General 21 Digit and corner coordinates of the site.

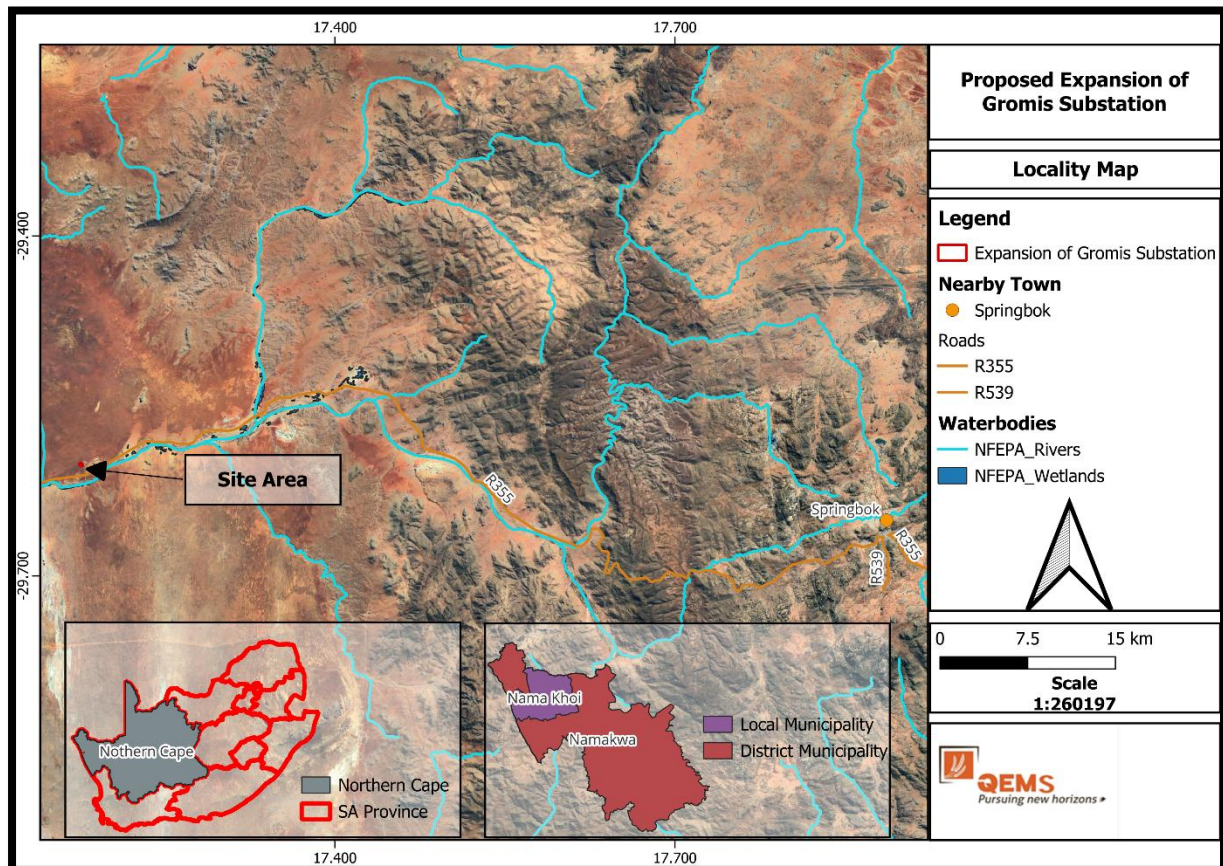


Figure 2: Locality Map

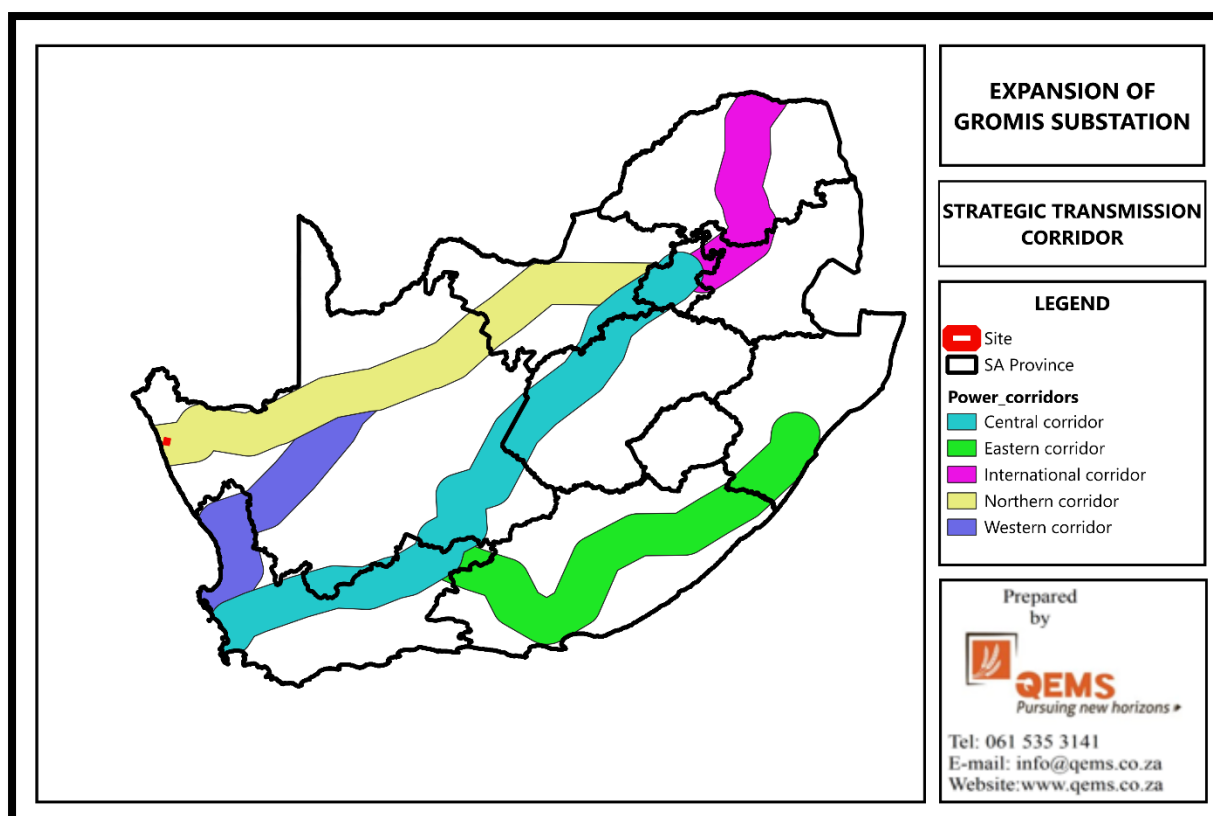


Figure 3: Strategic Transmission Corridor

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5.2 NWA

The developer intends to drill a borehole; a formal water use license application (WULA) will be lodged to the Department of Water and Sanitation in terms of Section 21 of the National Water Act (Act No 36 of 1998). The WULA Procedure is regulated under the ‘Procedural Requirements for WaterUse License Applications and Appeals (GNR 267, 24 March 2017) published in terms of the NWA.

6. BASIC ASSESSMENT PROCESS

The findings and mitigation measures are recorded in the Environmental Management Programme (EMPr) which becomes a legally binding document upon approval.

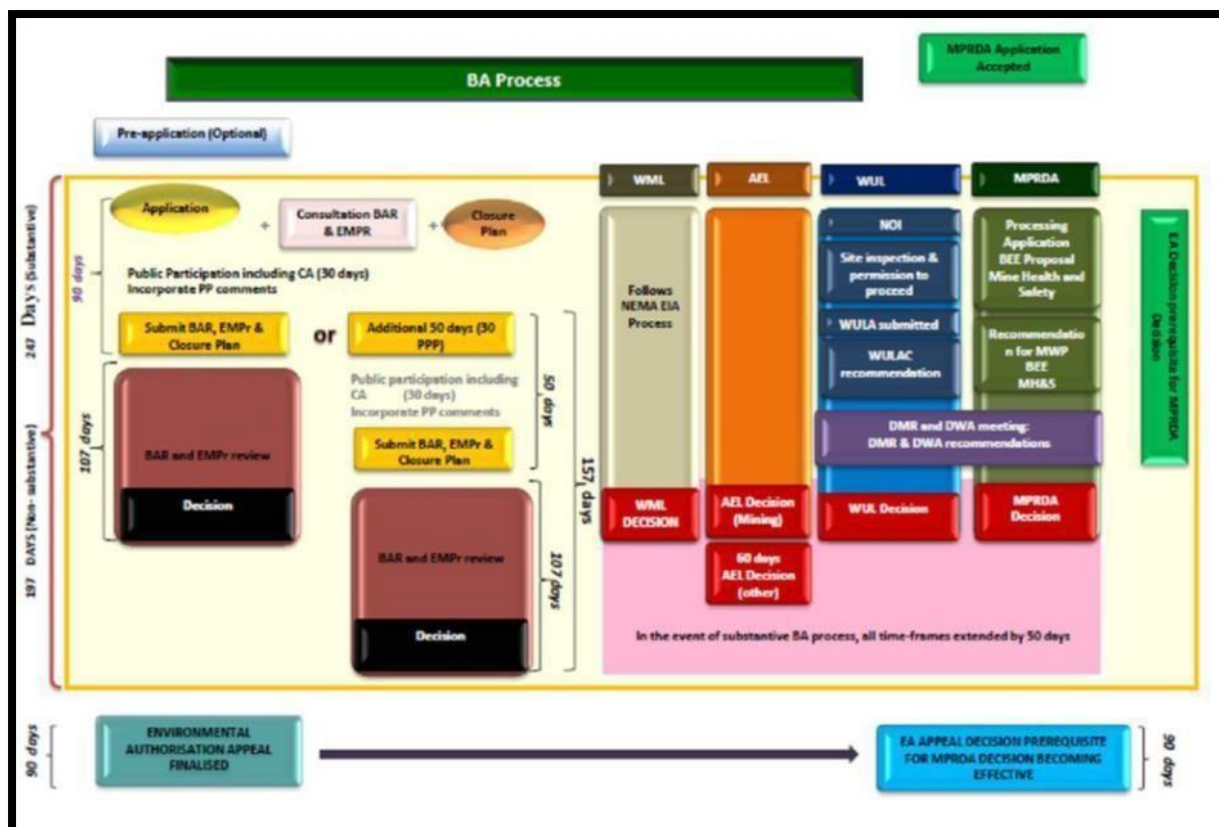


Figure 4: BAR Process flow

8. NEED AND DESIRABILITY OF THE PROJECT

Electricity has become an essential for daily living, and it is the source of economic power in South Africa, having access to electricity for 24 hours without any disruptions is essential for improving livelihoods of the South Africans and ensuring businesses that are fully dependent on electricity are operational to full capacity. The addition of the Synchronous Condensers will help bring stability to the transmission grid in the Northern Cape Province, improving the livelihoods of the people dependent to the electricity generated and distributed through the Gromis substation.

9 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROCESS (PPP)

Public Participation is a key requirement of the EIA process. The PPP needs to be conducted in line with the NEMA EIA Regulations 2014 (Regulation 39 - 44). The PPP aims to engage stakeholders or I&APs and provide an opportunity for the expression of public views on the environmental impacts of the applications. All public issues, comments and views on impacts and alternatives are documented, addressed, and responded in the EIA process and incorporated into environmental reports for consideration by the decision-making authority (DFFE). It is therefore imperative that relevant I&APs are identified and involved in the PPP from the beginning of the EIA process to help focus the EIA plan.

9.1 PPP Plan

One rounds of public consultation is planned as part of the EIA process to satisfy the NEMA requirements. (See EIA process Schedule provided under Section 6).

During the PPP the following will take place:

- ❖ I&AP Registration
- ❖ Circulation of BID, BAR and EMP_r for 30-days review and comment.

The project will be announced to the public through the following means:

- ❖ A newspaper advertisement
- ❖ Placement of on-site notices in the project area and public venues.
- ❖ A BID (this document), BAR, EMP_r will be available at public venues
- ❖ Distribution of the BAR and its appendices to stakeholders for comment and review (30 calendar day review period).
